Truth and Reconciliation Day at SouthPointe School was marked by a school-wide assembly September 29th, 2022. Each class explored the truth of the Residential School system and the lasting effects of assimilation policies in Canada. Students created amazing artist representations of how we can build a pathway to reconciliation together.

Students also made personalized buttons for students who may not have orange shirts. Ribbons and fabrics were also disbursed to every class for anyone who wanted to wear them. Providing connection in place to the story of Phyllis Webstad and honoring the voices of Residential schooling survivors. Students participated in poetry and virtual sessions with artist Connie Kulhavy through Rupertsland Institute. Other classes participated in sessions offered by the National Centre for Truth and Reconciliation.







Students led our assembly and I felt pride in our strong, resilient school community as we held silence with our Treaty 6 and Métis Nation flags raised again to acknowledge the land and our history. Our bulletin boards represent a community that shows "Every Child Matters" today and everyday.
