Truth and Reconciliation Day at SouthPointe School was marked by a school-wide assembly September 29th, 2023. Each class explored the truth of the Residential School system and the lasting effects of assimilation policies in Canada. Students created amazing artist representations of how we can build a pathway to reconciliation together.

Students also made pins for students who may not have orange shirts. Ribbons and fabrics were also disbursed to every class for anyone who wanted to wear them. Providing connection in place to the story of Phyllis Webstad and honoring the voices of Residential schooling survivors. Students participated in poetry and virtual sessions with artist Connie Kulhavy through Rupertsland Institute. Other classes participated in sessions offered by the National Centre for Truth and Reconciliation. A video was made to share what some staff and students felt Orange Shirt Day meant to them. Thank you to students from the Leadership 9 class who interviewed, led our assembly, did daily announcements and made posters. I felt pride in our strong, resilient school community as we held silence to acknowledge the land and our history.



At our front foyer we have had our art installation hung over the summer. SouthPointe School was honoured to have the presence and teachings of Métis artist and knowledge keeper Connie Kulhavy in Spring 2022, creating a mural that reflects the lands of Fort Saskatchewan. Every community member was able to create, through the medium of acrylic paint, a wooden disc that reflects their connection to this place and place it on the mural. Our community of

Fort Saskatchewan came to be because of the North Saskatchewan river and the plants, animals and opportunities the river provided and continues to provide to the life that surrounds it. She will be coming back to help us personalize our school space even more! We also had our first Fort Saskatchewan Family Gathering in Turner Park. It was lovely to see some families and visit with Elder Evelyn Day.
